

# Instructions

> sticking to doors/walls

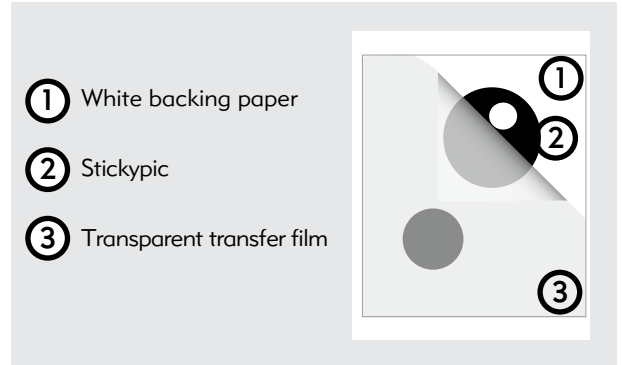
## 1 Before you begin

For optimum stick, your surface needs to be smooth, dry & clean and free from dust & grease. Your stickypic loves hard, smooth shiny surfaces, their adhesive quality is less effective on textured matt paints. A sample logo has been supplied to test your desired area. Please allow 2 weeks for any freshly painted surfaces to cure.

**We recommend you tape the stickypic onto your surface using masking tape and check that you are happy with the position, then mark the corners before preparation.**

**If you are sticking onto glass, please download see our glass instructions overleaf.**

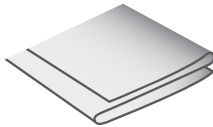
If you are not quite ready to stick, store your new stickypic flat in a clean, dry place, sheltered from the sun for up to a year.



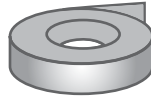

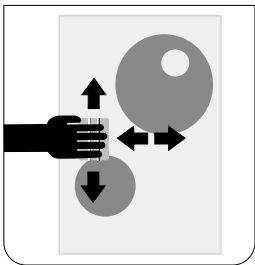

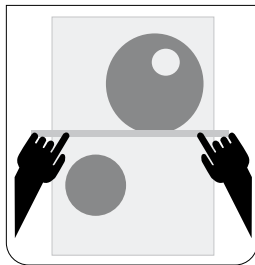

## 3 Preparation



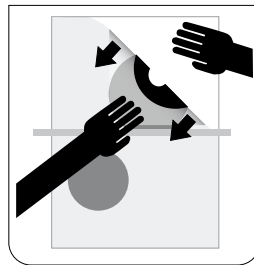
### Rub

Before application, lay your design onto a flat surface, graphic side down and firmly rub the scraper over the entire backing paper. Use the test disc provided to check the adhesive property of your surface.



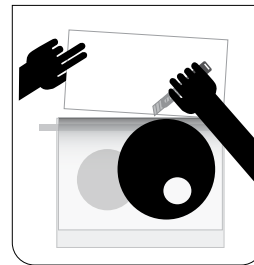
### Position

Place your Stickypic in position and apply a line of masking tape across the centre holding it securely to your surface.



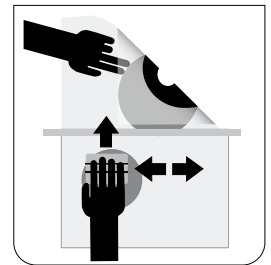
### Roll

Start at one corner and slowly peel away the backing paper with a rolling action. Some intricate patterns may want to stick to the paper backing; simply rollback and repress the stickypic onto the transfer film.



### Slice

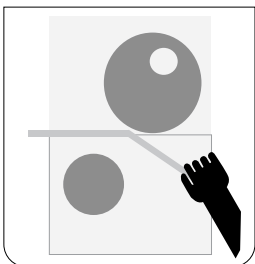
Allow the transfer film to hang down over the masking tape. Using a knife or scissors, remove the excess backing paper from the upper half, taking care not to damage your surface or the transfer film.



### Rub

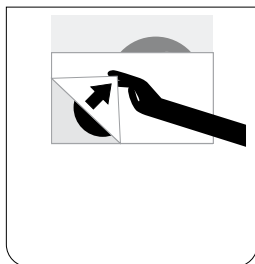
Starting in the middle, use the scraper in a slow but firm motion from the centre to the outer edges. Overlap your movements as you progress to the top, this will avoid wrinkles and bubbles.

## 4 The big stick



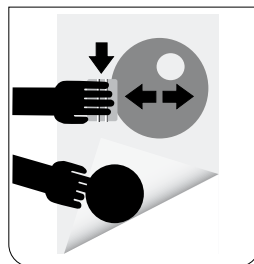
### Peel the tape

Carefully remove the masking tape.



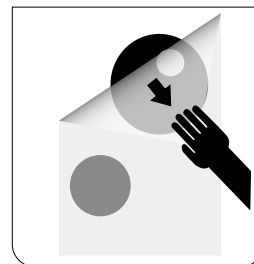
### Lift & peel

Lift the lower half and fold back. Starting at one of the lower corners, slowly peel away the remaining backing paper in a rolling motion.



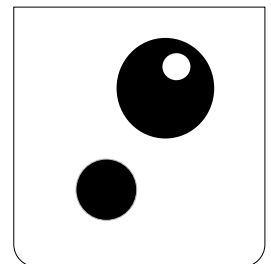
### Rub

Starting above the centre, use the scraper in a slow and firm motion. Working from left to right, overlap your movements to prevent any wrinkles and bubbles.



### Peel some more

Slowly and carefully from one corner, peel the transfer film away at an angle of 180. Some intricate patterns may want to stick to the film; simply rollback and repress the stickypic onto the surface.



### Appreciate

Now stand back and admire! If you notice bubbles, simply prick them with a pin and smooth them out with a soft cloth. Congratulations!

# Instructions

> sticking to glass or very smooth surfaces

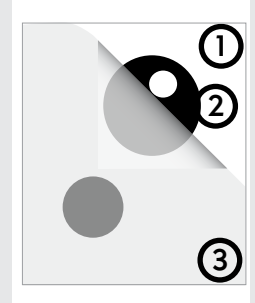
## 1 Before you begin

For optimum stick, your surface needs to be smooth, dry & clean and free from dust & grease. Your stickypic loves glass as its so smooth but you will need to wet the whole area to make it easier. A sample logo has been supplied to test your desired area.

**We recommend you tape the stickypic onto your surface using masking tape and check that you are happy with the position, then mark the corners before preparation.**

If you are not quite ready to stick, store your new stickypic flat in a clean, dry place, sheltered from the sun for up to a year.

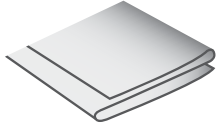
- ① White backing paper

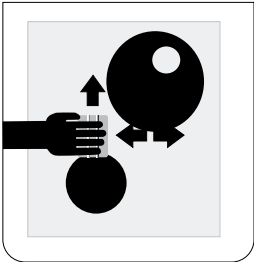

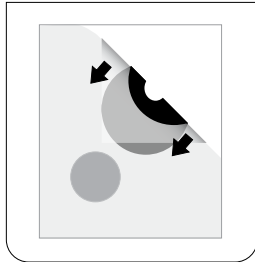

## 3 Preparation



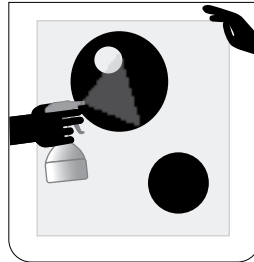
### Rub

Before application, lay your design onto a flat surface, graphic side down and firmly rub the scraper over the entire backing paper. Use the test disc provided to check the adhesive property of your surface.



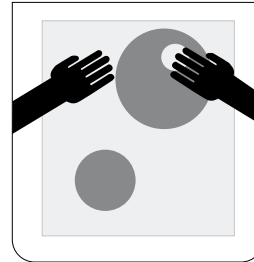
### Roll

Start at one corner and slowly peel away the backing paper with a rolling action. Some intricate patterns may want to stick to the backing paper; simply rollback and repress the stickypic onto the transfer film.



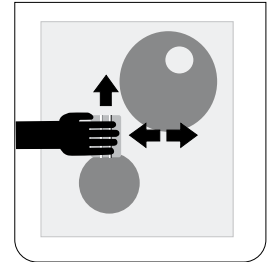
### Spray

Using the spray (1 drop of washing up liquid to one half litre of water) lightly cover the adhesive side of the stickypic and the transfer film. Spray the glass it is going onto to make it easier to move into position.



### Apply

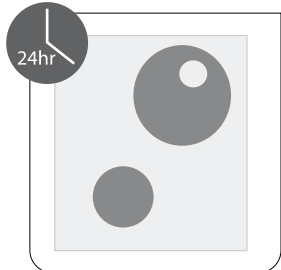
carefully position and apply your stickypic to the desired surface.



### Rub

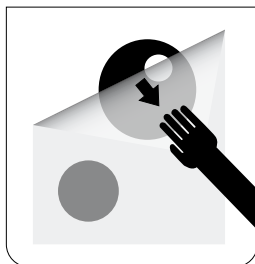
Smooth one edge first to avoid wrinkles and bubbles and continue smoothing out the transfer film. Using the scraper, slowly and firmly rub the stickypic all over to remove the excess water to the edges and onto the cloth.

## 4 The big stick



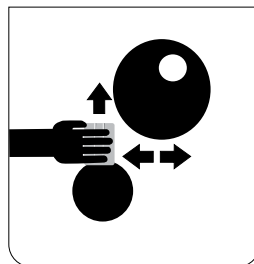
### Wait

To ensure a firm bond, wait 24hrs before taking the transfer film off.



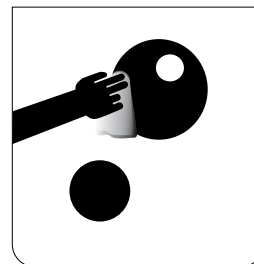
### Roll

Slowly and carefully from one corner, peel the transfer film away at an angle of 180. Some intricate patterns may want to stick to the film; simply rollback and repress the stickypic onto the surface then continue to peel.



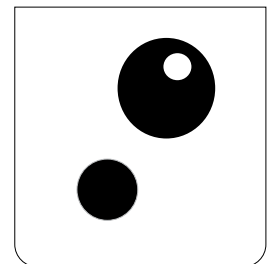
### Rub some more

Rub again in a slow and firm motion, pay particular care across edges and intricate patterns. Working from left to right, overlap your movements to prevent any wrinkles and bubbles.



### Wipe

Using a soft cloth, wipe away any excess fluid.



### Appreciate

Now stand back and admire! If you notice bubbles, simply prick them with a pin and smooth them out with a soft cloth. Congratulations!

> Little things that get in the way

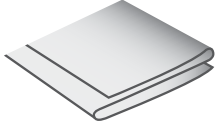
## 1 Before you begin

When you come across an obstacle during your big stick, don't fret, the instructions below will guide you through the easy process of cutting and sticking around the obstruction.

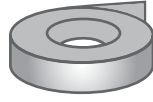

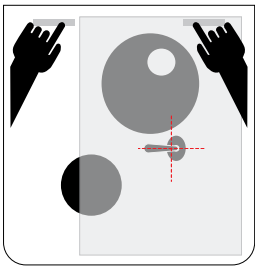

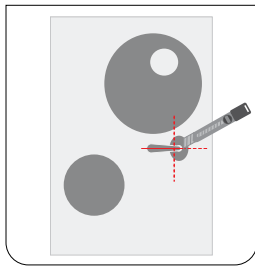

## 3 Preparation



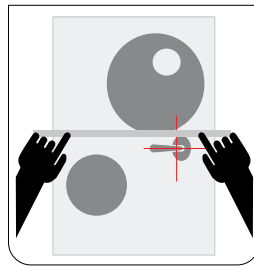
### Position

Place your Stickypic in position and apply small strips of masking tape to hold it securely to your surface. Mark where your obstruction is with a large cross, this will be your cutting guide.



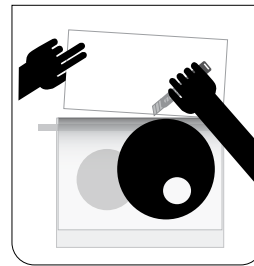
### Cut

Carefully slice through your Stickypic with the knife following your cutting guide, your obstruction will now show through the paper.



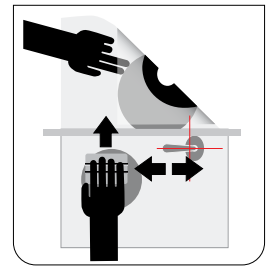
### Position

Place your Stickypic in position and apply a line of masking tape across the centre holding it securely to your surface.



### Slice

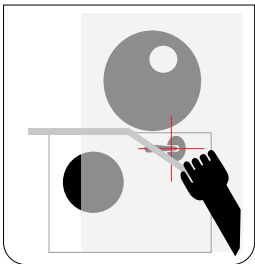
Allow the transfer film to hang down over the masking tape. Using a knife or scissors, remove the excess backing paper from the upper half, taking care not to damage your surface or the transfer film.



### Rub

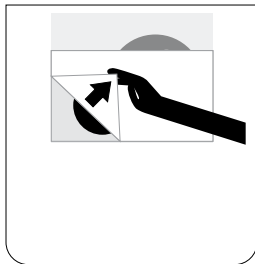

### Peel some more

Now stand back and admire! If you notice bubbles, simply prick them with a pin and smooth them out with a soft cloth. Congratulations!
